2.1	Outline – What is the purpose of this policy?  Specify aims and objectives	The purpose of the policy is to demonstrate the Interventions Melton Borough Council #9MBC) will put in place, with the support of partners, to support the borough up until the end of March 2025? This will enable MBC to draw down £1.19m in funding from central government to deliver these interventions. These interventions are split between three key themes, community and place, supporting local businesses, people and skills.
2.2	What specific group(s) is the policy designed to affect / impact and what is the intended change or outcome for them?	The purpose of the proposal is that it will positively impact all members of the public within the local community, with an intended positive outcome on those individuals with a protected characteristic. It is expected that by creating a more diverse environment, with better access to support and the opportunities these provide, this will create a more supported and socially mobile community as well as a more buoyant and local economy that is growing sustainably and providing genuine opportunities to our residents. Furthermore, those with the protected characteristics of age, such as students at the nearby SMB group will have additional social, experiential and employment opportunities as a result of the projects being developed via this plan. This should also help bridge the gap of younger local visitors to the town centre and encourage those from a wider geographical area to travel in also. This may also encourage the placement and further work opportunity for those with the protected characteristic of disability:  The proposals identified shall amongst other things; increase employment opportunities for all within the local community as generally all members of the local community will have access to a wider selection of job roles/as more investment in businesses and Small – Medium Enterprises will be made. This could also provide further opportunity for those with certain protected characteristics to gain employment as well as access to support programmes and other opportunities whereby otherwise this has not always been achievable due to certain economical/social barriers such as issues around rural travel.  Ultimately the proposals in the plan are broad in their reach and will likely have a direct or indirect positive impact on residents, visitors and businesses. The degree to which people are impacted will be determined by the particular intervention that is being delivered through the UKSPF funding but all potential impacts on those directly participating in the interventions are expected to be positive



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2.3	Which groups have been consulted as part of the creation or review of the policy?	Significant consultation has been undertaken throughout the UKSPF being developed and drafted. Very broadly this consultation consists of  - Engagement and feedback from members of the Council's scrutiny committee  - 2 workshops for members and stakeholders to attend to feedback comments  - Ongoing iterative discussions with local stakeholders through the advisory board to ensure local challenges are being met and that there is no duplication with the offer that currently exists in the area.  - Ongoing discussion with delivery partners and bodies to ensure there is no duplication between what is being proposed within the plan and what is already being provided and look at potential joint working opportunities.  - Updates and discussion with the Local MP to ensure the plan reflects the challenges they have been made aware of by local constituents on a daily basis  All comments received have been noted and where applicable the document has been updated to include points raised

Based upon this and consultation with partners it was identified key issues such as accessibility to programmes and services, lack of opportunity in rural areas and communication/ promotions including how we outreach to a wider and diverse audience. This may affect different diverse groups such as age as mentioned above, however the proposal will positively mitigate this.  Demographic or other information relating to this has been updated and assessed since the latest release of census information. This has been used to inform programmes identified within the UKSPF plan that will be submitted  Disability: there are concerns around access in relation to disability but also rural isolation. Within the plan there are projects relating to accessibility, town centre improvements have been identified. Throughout these and similar projects we will work to ensure the town is as easy to access and navigate around in order to mitigate these types of concerns  Age: it has been highlighted through the consultation that there needs to be more explicit mention of opportunities for the youth of the town, this is in regards to access to employment but also social activities, this has been taken on board and the plan has been updated to reflect this.
